BISHOP'S MESSAGE FOR NOVEMBER 2022

Papal Intention for November: Pope Francis draws our attention to little children who need our care and tenderness. But many children are deprived of family affection and acceptance. They are orphans, homeless, and victims of war. Many suffer because of the abuse by adults and sometimes due to bullying by their companions. We are invited to pray for the suffering children, and prayer certainly should move us to act with special concern towards those who are severely deprived of love. Can we withhold our love from those who need it most?

Indulgences: The month of November invites us to experience and live the Communion of Saints by availing the spiritual help for the dear departed through indulgences. An Indulgence is not the remission of sins but the remission of the punishment due to sin. Kindly instruct the Faithful about this great treasure the Church provides. According to the teaching of the Church, "even after mortal sin has been forgiven and, as a necessary consequence, the eternal punishment it deserves has been remitted, and even if slight or venial sin has been remitted, the forgiven sinner can need further purification, that is, be deserving of temporal punishment to be expiated in this life or in the life to come, namely, in Purgatory" (Manual of Indulgences). An indulgence is drawn from the Church's wonderful treasury of Christ's sacrifice and the merits of the saints who walked the way of Christ. "The doctrine of faith regarding indulgences and the praiseworthy practice of gaining them confirm and apply, with special efficacy for attaining holiness, the deeply consoling mysteries of the Mystical Body of Christ and the Communion of Saints" (Manual of Indulgences).

Plenary Indulgence: The Manual of Indulgences instructs that we can avail the plenary indulgence by visiting the cemetery and offering prayers for the dead or by praying in a Church or an oratory, for the dear departed and by reciting *Our Father* and the *Creed* from 1 to 8 November. We are invited to offer it for the souls in Purgatory. **Partial Indulgence** can be availed by

praying for the dead on any day by devoutly visiting a cemetery and at least mentally praying for the dead; secondly, by devoutly reciting lauds or vespers from the Office of the Dead or the prayer *Eternal rest*.

Ruby Jubilee of the Bidar Mission: The Diocese of Mangalore, under the leadership of Late Bishop Basil Salvadore D'Souza took up the challenging task of bringing the Good News to the People of Bidar, Bhalki and surrounding regions. The mission begun in 1982, has grown to become an independent Diocese. The past 40 years have shown the lasting fruit the Lord has brought forth through human efforts. Therefore, it is but apt that we join with the Diocese of Gulbarga in celebrating this great event by participating in the Jathra Utsav 2022, to be held from 4 to 6 November 2022, at Bhalki. Let us pray for Bishop Robert Miranda, the Priests and Religious and Lay Faithful who have contributed their share in making the dream of the Lord fulfilled.

The Decennial Celebrations of Same Mission: We have already celebrated the 10 years of our presence in Tanzania, in the Same Diocese, at Kifaru Parish and the four Substations attached to it. The people are catechised with the help of the Catechists, and the liturgy is well-organised. SCCs and SVPs are promoted to form and catechise the people and help the poor. We notice immense amount of growth of the area and the Bishop of Same, Most Rev. Rogath Kimaryo, during his message on 16 October 2022, said that a miracle has taken place.

A lot of infrastructure is built, and those in the dilapidated state are renovated. A clergy house is built, and the mission house is bought. Land, vehicles and machines are procured. Classrooms, halls, laboratories, dormitories, kitchens and other facilities are provided. A chapel and prayer hall are being built, and now the students of Secondary School have a separate place for prayer.

Our priests have worked hard to provide St Joseph's Boys' Science Secondary School, with more than 350 students residing in the hostels and getting formed integrally. The Rupert Home is

a House for more than 100 children belonging to 5-7 standards, hailing from the poorer families. They are accompanied on a daily basis and also are educated by the teachers both in the Government Schools and at the Rupert Home. Even teachers from Government Schools are given some remuneration so that the children could avail good education.

The Season of Creation is promoted through the children so that the *Laudato Si'* is concretely realised to show the need for greenery around us. The farm has saline soil and water, yet, experiments are being done, and training is being given so that the farm could be cultivated by promoting the effective microorganisms in preparing organic manure and pesticides, for which the Government has given a certificate of appreciation. The District Commissioner and Member of Parliament have highly spoken of the work of our priests. The farmers are taught the organic way of farming (Farming in God's Way), and a network of farmers is made. People are provided with clean drinking water at least in two places. The land with sandy soil and saline in nature is well used to produce maise, grow vegetables, rear animals, fowls, and fishes.

Solar power, the biogas energy are tapped; the people are helped to build houses and have some loan facilities to invest in self-employment. People of other denominations and other religions are also helped. Women are taught tailoring and preparation of sanitary pads and bags. Solar lights are distributed so that people could have light in their houses. Seminars and quizzes have been used to bring the message of Christ to the poor.

The donour-agencies like the Stockholm Diocese, the Italian Bishops' Conference, the Cologne Diocese, the group of Mrs Marilena Lingua and many others both from India and abroad have come forward to help concretely so that our brother priests could strategically plan and actualise those plans. The people-oriented programmes are meticulously planned and executed, thanks to the long-term accompaniment and guidance of Mr Charles Câmara of Stockholm Diocese. Likewise, religious

priests and sisters from India and abroad have extended their helping hand, enablingour brother priests to give their best.

All in all, the nation now knows where Kifaru is, thanks to the hard effort of our priests, Fr Alwyn D'Souza, the Mission Superior, Fr Hilary Lobo, the Parish Priest, Fr Victor Machado, the Headmaster, Fr Joseph Rodrigues, the Rupert Home Director and Treasurer, Fr George Crasta, the Warden and Bursar and Fr Jesudas D'Costa, the School Campus Director. Previously Fr Ronald Pinto and Fr Jason Lobo have served in this mission. Today, we can witness what the Lord has done through them. My heartiest congratulations to all the donours, our brother priests and those who have helped us in one way or another.

What has been taken up as a daring venture by Most Rev. Aloysius Paul D'Souza, the Bishop Emeritus and nurtured by the Bishop of Same, Most Rev. Dr Rogath Kimaryo, has borne fruit. May the name of the Lord be praised. Kindly do not forget to pray for the Same Mission and lend a helping hand to carry forward this noble task.

Advent begins on 27 November, and we begin the Liturgical Cycle A. I wish you all a happy season of Advent and fruitful preparation for the Coming of Our Lord.

The official priest lives the priesthood as if it were a job. It is convenient, it has its own schedules. And so, as he grows, he turns into a "spinster", with many manic habits, becoming a daily neurotic. Be careful of this. Don't seek your own comfort; the priesthood is a sacred service to God, the service of which the Eucharist is the highest grade, a service to the community (Pope Francis, Audience with the Priests and Seminarians Studying in Rome, 26.10.2022).

BIBLICAL COMMISSION, EPHPHATHA BIBLICAL CENTRE, MANGALA JYOTHI, DBCLC

1. *Bible Class - 2:* The Biblical Commission of our Diocese, in association with Ephphatha Biblical Centre, a unit of Mangala Jyothi, will be conducting bible classes on the Gospel of Luke from the second week of November 2022 for Five Saturdays. 2. *Bible Class - 1 :* Puttur Deanery is organising bible classes on the Gospel of Matthew from the second week of November 2022 for Five Sundays. The classes will be held on November 13, 20, 27 and December 4, 11, from 3.00 pm to 6.00 pm at Mai de Deus Church premises at Puttur.

3. The Sunday of the Word of God and Bible Week.

As we know, the 3rd Sunday of the Ordinary Time is celebrated as the Word of God Sunday throughout the Church, and we will celebrate it on 22 January 2023. Over the last couple of years, it has not been easy to celebrate it on a grand scale. Therefore, I request you to keep this date in mind and begin preparations well in advance. Dedicating the entire week to the Word of Godrelated activities would be fantastic. The Word of God Sunday can be the culmination of these activities.

Pope Francis, while solemnly declaring "that the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time is to be devoted to the celebration, study and dissemination of the word of God" (*Aperuit Illis*, 3), has given the following concrete suggestions for its celebration:

The various communities will find their own ways to mark this Sunday with a certain solemnity. It is important, however, that in the Eucharistic celebration, the sacred text be enthroned, in order to focus the attention of the assembly on the normative value of God's word. On this Sunday, it would be particularly appropriate to highlight the proclamation of the word of the Lord and to emphasise in the homily the honour that it is due. Bishops could celebrate the Rite of Installation of Lectors or a similar commissioning of readers, in order to bring out the importance of the proclamation of God's word in the liturgy. In this regard, renewed efforts should be made to provide members of the faithful with the training needed to be genuine proclaimers of the word, as is already the practice in the case of acolytes or extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion. Pastors can also find ways of giving a Bible, or one of its books, to the entire assembly as a way of showing the importance of learning how to read, appreciate and pray daily with sacred Scripture, especially through the practice of lectio divina" (*Aperuit Illis*, 3).

Some of these suggestions of the Pope can be implemented throughout the year, as Pope himself says, "A day devoted to the Bible should not be seen as a yearly event but rather a year-long one, for we urgently need to grow in our knowledge and love of the Scriptures and the risen Lord. He continues to speak his word and to break bread in the community of believers" (*Aperuit Illis*, 8).

We are planning to provide a small toolkit to assist in this regard to the parishes in December. However, I request the parishes to hold a meeting and well in advance plan for this Sunday. Along with the suggestions made by Pope himself, the following and other suitable activities could be planned at the parish level on Bible Sunday or in Bible Week:

1. Bible Quiz, 2. Bible reading sessions, 3. Bible Exhibition, 4. Biblical model-making competitions or Seminars, 5. Bible Housie-Housie, 6. Biblical storytelling, 7. Biblical Characters Fancy Dress, 8. Biblical Evening with Biblical Skits, enacting of biblical passages, songs, dances, 9. Bible manuscript-writing competitions and biblical drawing competitions, chart making etc., 10. Bible Study sessions, 11. Biblical Film screening, 12.This list can continue. These and other similar activities can be organised for the faithful of all age groups.

II. Commission for Catechetics

The five candles on the wreath signify the meaning of Jesus' second and first coming. From 27 November December 16, we reflect on the second coming of Christ, and from 17-24 December, we reflect on the first coming. It is the time for immediate preparation for Christmas. To facilitate this celebration, Mangala Jyothi has published a Christmas Novena book Emmanuel which contains the rite of blessing of Christmas wreath, 9 days of reflections and Novena prayer. - 2. Choir Members' Training (for Private Choirs/Eng/Konk) & City and Episcopal Deanery: We will be organising a training programme for the choir representatives of English/Konkani, private choirs of the city (Choir Master, Musician and other 2 representatives) on 20 November 2022, Sunday at St Joseph Seminary, Mangalore from 02.30 pm to 05.30 pm. I request the Parish Priests of Episcopal City and City deanery to inform your choir members about this training. We will be issuing certificates for the participants. We are trying to register the names of the private choirs at Mangala Jyothi and will inform you later. Kindly register the names at Mangala Jyothi before 15 November 2022.

Once again, I request the Parish Priests not to allow choir masters or choir members to select the hymns that suit them. It is the responsibility of the priests to guide the choir. VISITING MANGALORE-SAME MISSION – OUR MISSION/HOLY LAND IN AFRICA

Who would have thought I would visit and see Mangalore-Africa Mission in Same Diocese, which is in Tanzania? Certainly, I did not. But it just so happened that during a meeting, the Bishop informed us that he would be visiting Same on the occasion of the Decennial Celebration of the Mission and asked if anyone of us would join him. Without much reflection, I said yes when he asked me if I would. Upon reflection, I thought, "I haven't been to the Holy Land, although I could have, but now, why not to the Mission Land, which is as holy as the land where Jesus became incarnate and proclaimed the Good News urging his followers to "Go into the whole world". He did not say, "Come to the land of my birth and death!". In fact, Jesus was 'sent' by the Father as a missionary to the world, just as Jesus commanded his followers to "Go into the world". I consider every mission land a holy land because it is where Jesus is made incarnate, alive and active beyond Nazareth, Galilee and Jerusalem. Therefore, I deem visiting our mission land in Same is on par with visiting Holy Land.

His Excellency Most Rev. Peter Paul Saldanha, Bishop of Mangalore and I left the Bishop's House for the airport at 6.15 pm on 10 October 2022 and reached our destination, Kifaru Church and Presbytery, at 5.45 pm on 11 October. Right away, a full schedule of activities, meetings, travel and various programmes got underway. Boys and girls from Rupert Children Home staged at 6.30 pm an hour-long programme on "Season of Creation". These underprivileged kids - some of whom came from dysfunctional families – displayed their talents and innate abilities. One seventh-grade student provided a simultaneous translation of the Bishop's message. We were stunned to discover that this youngster did not study in the English medium!

In the church vicinity, there exists Rupert Children Home started in 2018. It accommodates about 100 very poor children – boys and girls - of classes V, VI and VII. But they go to the local school. They are given all the facilities to stay; they receive

holistic formation and coaching to excel in their studies. The Mission has employed 4 teachers in the school so everyone can receive a top-notch education because the government school these students attend hardly has enough teachers. To ensure that the local area's under privileged children receive a high-quality education, the Mission also provides the salary of 2 other teachers it has employed in other government schools. What a paradox! Mission providing teachers and their salary in government schools to educate children!

With the inauguration of the Mission about 10 years ago, Kifaru, until then a sub-station, was constituted as the parish and handed over to the Society of Mangalore Africa Mission, and Rev. Hilary Lobo was installed as its Parish Priest (*Paroko* in Swahili language). Kifaru Parish is dedicated to Our Lady of Immaculate Conception (*Bikira Maria Mkingiwa Dhambiya Asili* literally means "Virgin Mary Protected from Original Sin"). It has four sub-stations – Kalimani, Jipe, Kileo, Kivisini. All our priests have taken up a sub-station and dedicate themselves to their pastoral work. These stations are very far apart and are not connected by a good road. Furthermore, our missionary priests have taken over Butu, a station 50 kilometres away from Kifaru. The parish pastoral ministry is amazing, with all of its facets, and the involvement of our priests with the local community is incredible.

The daily Mass at the Parish Church begins at 6 am, and all children from Rupert Home, their instructors, and Ursuline Convent sisters enthusiastically participate. The children's lovely singing to the drum beats, their slow, graceful, swaying gestures of the body and hands, and their boomingly loud response to the prayers is a beautiful sight to behold and experience. The children's "Amina" (*Amen* in Swahili) sounded like the thunder of heaven! If you believe 6 am is too early for a Mass with children, you should know that the Small Christian Community meetings take place at 6.30 am on Saturdays, and many people attend!

During our stay in the Mission, our Bishop blessed on three different days, nine new houses built for the poor and the Bishop of Same blessed the tenth house on the evening of the Decennial Celebrations held on Sunday, October 16. It must not be forgotten that the Mission has constructed more homes for the needy and the impoverished over the past ten years. But these ten houses were blessed as part of celebrating the mission's tenth anniversary. They represent yet another legacy of the mission's service and joy-sharing with additional underprivileged people. The poverty of the people in the area and the lack of basic resources and facilities is an eye-opener for us. People struggle because the land is dry with hardly any rain in recent years and no possibility of cultivation. Houses do not have electricity, and the Mission has supplied more than 4000 solar lamps to poor families.

The establishment of the St. Joseph Boys' Science Secondary School represents a significant milestone in the Mission's history. This school has garnered national attention for its educational quality according to its motto, "Building Competence & Character," and its vision, "Integral Transformation Through Education." It has well-furnished classrooms, conducive dormitories, a well-ventilated and hygienic kitchen, a very good borewell connected to 15 thousand litres overhead water tanks with 24 hours running water system, electricity with a standby generator, Science Laboratory Complex and a Computer Lab. It boasts of having a committed faculty and 350 residential students. The school has ascended to unprecedented heights in less than ten years of existence. It is ranked first among the 22 secondary schools in Mwanga District, fourth among the 276 schools in the Kilimanjaro region, and 38th among the 3908 secondary schools in Tanzania as a whole.

We visited and spent four hours in the SJS Organic Farm of the Mission. It sprawls over 50 acres of land and has an Ecological Organic Agriculture (EOA) Centre for Excellence. This unit concentrates on Socio-Economic Mission through farming, training farmers and promoting ecology and environment as envisioned in *Laudato si*. It has several initiatives, such as Farming in God's Way. Pope Francis relates the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor; the earth's cry is no different than "the cry of the poor". Use of pesticides and chemical fertilisers, which poison

fields and the water table, gradually stop the earth from being useful for inhabitation, cultivation and production. This mission unit emphasises ecological education, ecological spirituality, community involvement, participatory action and family sustenance. The Farm has various field crops, horticulture, green leaf plants, fruit production, piggery poultry, fishery, cattle, bees, rabbits, organic manure, bio-pesticides and repellant products, low-cost rural technology units and so on. This Organic Farm that functions as a research and training centre has attracted the attention of the government, international organisations, NGOs, and universities. It is a novel and mega initiative.

On October 14, we paid a visit to the Bishop of Same and met with him, the Chancellor, and the Financial Administrator from 10 am until 1.30 pm. The Bishop offered his appreciation and assessment of the Mission and the ministry of our priests in his diocese. He expressed admiration for the great accomplishment in a short period. As regards his expectations and hope for more initiatives in the health sector and scholarships to the poor of the locality, we said that "we are the poor helping the poor" and have with us more generosity and dedication to offer than resources, and with this, we will do our best. We are thankful to the Bishop of Same, who welcomed us with amazing hospitality and a magnificent banquet following the meeting. We appreciate his encouragement to our brother priests, whom he considers his own.

The main emphasis of the tour was the Mission's Decennial Celebration on October 16, which many of you may have seen on YouTube. The solemn eucharistic liturgy, which lasted until midday, started at 9.30 am with the welcoming of the bishops - Bishop Peter Paul Saldanha of Mangalore, Bishop Rogath Kimaryo of Same, and Bishop Emeritus Jacob Koda of Same. After a brief break of 30 minutes for refreshments, the Stage Programme commenced at 12.30 pm and ended at 3.30 pm with festive lunch for all. Politicians, business people, friends of the Mission, government officials – Diwan, MP, DC, representatives from other religions, priests, religious, and lay faithful participated

in the celebration. In fact, more than 1200 people attended the grand celebration.

Our only 'outing' during our mission trip was to the Ngorongoro Crater, the largest intact volcanic caldera in the world and an amazing destination for safaris as it is a paradise for wild animals with an area of 264 square kilometres. We need a special vehicle to traverse the area. In the middle of our safari in the Crater, the front tyre of our vehicle came out, and the vehicle rested on the tyre that lay flat on the ground. Had this 'accident' happened in a different place within the Crater, such as on a steep climb, downhill, or highway, we cannot say where we would have been! Our driver contacted the other vehicles via wireless service, and one tourist (a young man from Chile) came forward to offer us a return ride in the vehicle he hired. During lunch, Mr Charles Câmara from the Diocese of Stockholm, who was with us, was having a conversation with him and came to know that the young man from Chile was an entrepreneur with a software company who, for convenience, chose to visit Africa this year although he had the desire to visit India. On Mr Câmara's request, this fine young guy, though not a Christian, expressed a readiness to consider coming next year as a volunteer for two months to Mangalore-Africa Mission and providing instruction and essential skills in computer and software to the local youth. God can write straight on a crooked line. The 'accident' made way for 'a mission incidence' where a young man from Chile was drawn to Same Mission in Africa!

From 9.00 am to 12 noon on October 20, we met with the Mission Team (Frs Alwyn, Hilary, Victor, Joseph, George, and Jesudas). After lunch at 12.30 pm, we left Mangalore-Same Mission in Kifaru at 1.15 pm to head to Kilimanjaro Airport for our return trip. The following day, we reached the Bishop's House, Kodialbail, at about 12.20 pm, renewed and encouraged by what we heard, saw and experienced in the Mission our dear brother priests cared for. The Bishop has recounted their work and activities in his message for November, which I do not repeat. The Mangalore-Same Mission has accomplished more

than what meets the eye and reaches the ear. So great is our priests' generosity, commitment, and journey of faith in the mission land, that God could not let them alone but began to work miracles through them. The journey of 10 years in Same diocese at Kifaru Parish, Rupert Children Home, St Joseph Science Secondary School, SJS Organic Farm and Centre for Excellence, and many more great and small initiatives is nothing short of a journey of faith, grace and miracles. It is where faith, hope and charity have met: the **faith** of our brother priests to move to the land shown by the Bishops of Mangalore (Bishop Aloysius Paul and Bishop Peter Paul), the **hope** of the Bishop of Same and the African faithful to the ministry from our priests, and the **love**/charity of generous benefactors/patrons — the dioceses, individual and corporate donours, and the prayers of all.

What Fr Victor Machado wrote at the end of his 3 years of mission ministry echoes the feelings of all our priests in Same: "We had tough times in the Mission. But each time, the Lord intervened and came to our help. After each struggle, we came out strong; it has given us the experience to face future challenges. We have also made progress in reaching out to the needy through different programs, which gives us a sense of satisfaction in having a meaningful stay among the people over here. Surely, we have miles to go and promises to keep, but when God is with us, who can be against us?" (July 26, 2016)

Our priests in the Mission need encouragement and support – spiritual and economic - by which they will be able to do greater things for the glory of God and the good of his holy people. Their tremendous work amazes us and makes us ask: Would these priests have been able to do here in Mangalore what they have done in the Same Mission? The love of the Mission impels them, the encouragement received from people of goodwill inspires them, and God's grace strengthens them. Their ministry in the mission should inspire us to give to the mission! Some give by going to (work in) the missions, and others go by giving to the (works of) missions.

CAN A BISHOP CONCELEBRATE MASS WITH PRIEST (PRESBYTER) CELEBRANTS?

Whether it is permissible for a Bishop to concelebrate on the occasion of the jubilee of a certain Priest in a way that he takes a position among the Presbyters/Priests (just as concelebrants) and concedes the role of the principal celebrant to the Priest who is celebrating his jubilee? This question was addressed to the Congregation for Divine Worship a few years ago, and their response was "NO" (Notitiae, 46[2009], p. 170).

In explaining its negative response, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments declared that the current liturgical norm has a theological premise based on the wisdom of the Fathers and supports with all evidence the necessity that the Bishop preside at the celebration, whether he celebrates the Eucharist or not. It quoted some passages from the *Ceremonial of Bishops (Caeremoniale Episcoporum)*, revised by the decree of Vatican II and published as *editio typica* in 1984 by the authority of Pope John Paul II. International Commission on English in the Liturgy (= ICEL) translated the Latin edition into English in 1989.

For example, no. 18 of the *Ceremonial of Bishops* (=*CB*) affirms that in every community of the altar gathered together under the Bishop as its sacred minister, the symbol of that charity and unity of the Mystical Body is shown. It is most fitting, therefore, that when the Bishop is present at a particular liturgical action, he, as the one signed with the fullness of the sacrament of Order, presides at the celebration. This is not done to increase the exterior solemnity of the rite but to signify the mystery of the Church in a more vivid light. It is fitting also that the Bishop should join presbyters with himself in the celebration.

Furthermore, in no. 175, the *CB* declares that for a just cause, he may be present at a Mass but not celebrate it, then he should preside at the celebration, at least by celebrating the liturgy of the word and blessing the people at the end. The current *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* (= *GIRM*), under no. 92, reiterates this principle.

The diocesan Bishop has a number of opportunities to take part in Mass without concelebrating. Consider the case where a Bishop attends a Priest's parent's funeral or his jubilee anniversary Mass. Because the Bishop would be obliged to preside at the Mass, he will usually abstain from concelebrating in that situation. Then what options does he have when he intends to take part in the celebration of the Mass?

The *GIRM*) states in no. 112: "At a Mass celebrated by the Bishop or at which he presides without celebrating the Eucharist, the norms found in the *Caeremoniale Episcoporum* (*Ceremonial of Bishops*) should be observed." The norms provided in the *Ceremonial of Bishops* distinguish two distinct situations:

The first is the Mass, at which the *Bishop presides but not as celebrant*. This provision is discussed in the third chapter of the *CB*. In it, the Bishop is seen to preside and yet not the principal celebrant of the Eucharist. In this option, the following may be noted:

- a) The Bishop puts on an alb, and over it the pectoral cross, a stole, and a cope of the colour of the occasion. In the entrance procession, he walks behind the celebrant. He uses the cathedra or the presidential chair at the sanctuary. From the beginning of Mass until the end of the liturgy of the word, he follows the directives and rubrics of the Mass as usual (nn. 176-179).
- b) After the liturgy of the word is ended, the Priest celebrant makes a deep bow to the Bishop and proceeds to receive the gifts brought forward by the faithful or to the altar and begins the liturgy of the Eucharist in accordance with the Order of Mass. If there is incensation at the preparation of gifts, the Bishop is incensed after the celebrant. He remains at the cathedra/presidential chair until the epiclesis in the eucharistic prayer (nn. 180-181).
- c) From the epiclesis until after the elevation of the chalice at the consecration the Bishop kneels facing the altar at the prie-dieu/kneeler prepared for him at a convenient place in the sanctuary. After this, he stands once again at the chair (n. 182).

d) If the Bishop receives communion, he takes the body and blood of the Lord at the altar, after the celebrant. He does not distribute the communion but remains seated at the chair or kneeling at the prie-dieu/kneeler. After the communion distribution and purification of the vessels are done, the Bishop prays the Prayer after Communion. Finally, he blesses the people in the usual way (nn. 183-184).

In the **second situation**, the *Bishop is present but does not preside*. It is described in no. 186. In this form, the Bishop does not preside in the manner described in the first situation. Instead, he participates in the Mass wearing mozzetta and rochet, and in the sanctuary, he remains in a place other than the cathedra or the presidential chair. Here we can envisage the following:

- a) In the entrance procession, the Bishop walks behind the celebrant, wearing what is known as choir dress (consisting of fuschia or purple coloured cassock, rochet or surplice, over it mozzetta, which is a small hooded cape extending to the elbows and buttoned in front and over the mozzetta a pectoral cross hung on a gold and green cord or a silver/gold chain), and skull-cap.
- b) In the sanctuary, he does not use the presidential chair/cathedra. Instead, he should sit in a place and prie-dieu prepared for him in the sanctuary in such a way it does not obscure the people's view of the altar or distract their attention away from it. If there is incensation at the preparation of gifts, the Bishop is incensed after the celebrant. According to Bishop Peter J. Elliott, "After the Prayer over the Offerings, the Bishop removes the skullcap and puts it on again during the purifications after the communion. If he wishes to receive Holy Communion, a stole should be provided" (*Ceremonies of the Modern Roman Rite*, San Francisco, St Ignatius Press, 2005, no. 523).
- c) According to *GIRM*, "... In particular cases and for a just cause, the Homily may even be given by a Bishop or a Priest who is present at the celebration but cannot concelebrate" (no. 66).

d) On some occasions, there may be a combination of both modes of vesture, for example, if the Bishop is in choir dress but is to make the final commendation at a funeral. In this case, after communion, he removes the mozzetta and replaces it with the cope, stole and mitre in order to direct the prayers (Edward McNamara, "When a Bishop Doesn't Concelebrate at a Mass" in ewtn.com).

The preeminent manifestation of the local Church is present when the Bishop celebrates the Eucharist, surrounded by his presbyters and ministers, and with the full, active participation of all God's holy people. Thus a Eucharistic liturgy at which a Bishop is the principal celebrant takes on a special character and dignity.

While the theology and liturgy give a prominent role to the Bishop in celebrations where the faithful assemble by requiring him to serve as Presiding or Principal Celebrant, the liturgical norms also provide two other options for him to be present at the Mass without being the celebrant: (a) Bishop presides but does not celebrate; (b) Bishop is present but does not preside. The funeral of the parent of a Priest, a Mass to celebrate a Priest's jubilee, or similar occasions in a Priest's life are situations when one of the options could be used by the Bishop when he is present for the occasion.
